It involves trusting that the next experience or opportunity is just as important as the foundation of what we hold on to for our sense of security. Courage is one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Being courageous doesn't mean we are fearless. It means that fear does not paralyze us.

Some of the most courageous times in my life have come not from travel but from overcoming self-doubt. Persevering in unconditional love, even when it is hard to find the good in another because of the hurt and pain they cause takes courage. When I think of the Last Supper and Jesus washing the feet of the disciples, it strikes me how it is easy to wash the feet of those who agree with us, support us, and love us. It is not so easy to wash the feet of those who make life difficult, are challenging, or are disrespectful to us. A comfort zone is a dangerous place. It comes easily for us to protect it and never want to leave it. To be open to the Holy Spirit means we must do the uncomfortable for the sake of the Kingdom.
