They could not work during the pandemic and now the war has stopped pilgrims from coming. The Christians are now less than 2% of the Holy Land population, down from 23% a century ago. With the war, many more are thinking about leaving.

A NOTE FROM FATHER EICKHOFF

Holy Week is now here.

This is the most important week of the Christian year. And, since it is the most important week, this time is filled with traditions that help to set this week apart from every other week of the year. I would like to suggest you practice a few of these traditions to you so that you may elevate in your own life this week that is above all other weeks of the year.

The first tradition is the practice of Morning Prayer on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. On these three days the Church does not have a morning Mass. Instead, the Christian faithful are encouraged to gather together and pray what is called the Liturgy of the Hours. The Liturgy of the Hours is the daily prayer of the Church that is especially prayed by priests, deacons, and religious. However, it is not limited to persons in those three categories. Everyone is encouraged to pray all or part of the Liturgy of the Hours. On these three days here at St. Anne Parish we will pray the Morning Prayer section of the Liturgy of the Hours together in the church at 8am. Prayer booklets will be provided.

The second tradition is the practice of visiting seven churches on Holy Thursday evening after the Mass of the Lord's Supper. On this evening many churches remain open after the Mass and the Blessed Sacrament is left exposed for adoration until midnight. This provides a fine opportunity for prayer before Easter Sunday. This tradition is also a great way to visit other Catholic parishes and to pray with and speak with other Catholics. In today's bulletin there is more information about the seven churches tradition as well as a listing of the locations and adoration times of all our neighboring parishes.

The third tradition is the blessing of food meant to be eaten on Easter Sunday. The Easter Sunday meal is of course a wonderful opportunity for a family get together. It should also be a celebration of the goodness of the Lord in our lives. Having the Easter meal blessed is a way to acknowledge God's action in our lives and of asking for His continued blessing. There will be a blessing of Easter food at St. Anne Parish on Saturday, April 19th at 12.30pm.

One final note. Please be aware that the Easter Vigil Mass on Saturday, April 19th at 7.30pm is the highest, most beautiful, and holiest Mass of the year. This is the Mass in which adults who have been striving to prepare for full initiation into the Church receive the sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and holy eucharist. This Mass is also the longest Mass of the year, and I fully expect it to run at least two hours if not more. The Easter Sunday Masses will run a more normal period of time.



At the end of the National Eucharistic Congress last year, Bishop Cozzens announced there would be a National Eucharistic Pilgrimage from Indianapolis to Los Angels in 2025.

Upon being asked, Bishop Hicks gratefully accepted the honor for the Diocese of Joliet to be the first Diocese on the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage St. Katharine Drexel Route.

The Diocese of Joliet will receive the Eucharist from the Pilgrims and Chaplains coming from a Mass in Indianapolis, IN on Sunday, May 18 and we will present the Eucharist to the Diocese of Peoria at St. Patrick Parish in Seneca, IL on Monday May 19.

On Holy Thursday, there is a devotion known as the Seven Churches Visitation.

In this special devotion, pilgrims adore Christ in seven different altars of repose while praying and reflecting on the passion of Christ.

At the end of each Holy Thursday Mass, the priest strips the altar and removes the Eucharist from the tabernacle to place it in repose on another nearby altar.

The Seven Churches Visitation (or Pilgrimage) is credited as beginning in Rome with St. Philip Neri in the 1500s. Neri would lead groups of faithful to visit each of the seven basilicas of Rome on Holy Thursday night as a way of keeping watch with Christ as though at the Garden of Gethsemane before his passion.

How do pilgrims going on this seven-church journey meditate on the passion of Christ?

Here are the Scripture excerpts to reflect on at each church:

- 1) Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane (Lk 22:39-46)
- 2) Jesus before Annas (Jn 18:19-22)
- 3) Jesus before Caiaphas (Mt 26:63-65)
- 4) Jesus before Pilate (Jn 18:35-37)
- 5) Jesus before Herod (Lk 23:8-9; 11)
- 6) Jesus before Pilate again (Mt 27:22-26)
- 7) Jesus's crucifixion and death (Mt 27:27-31)

Reflecting on the passion of Christ

At the first church, the faithful recall Jesus going from the upper room, where he celebrated the Last Supper with his disciples, to the Garden of Gethsemane, where he earnestly prayed and sweated blood in his agony over what was about to take place.

In the second church, the pilgrims meditate on Jesus being taken from the Garden of Gethsemane by the armed crowd to the house of Annas, the father-in-law of Caiaphas the high priest, where he was interrogated and slapped in the face.

In the third church, the prayer focuses on Jesus being brought to the house of Caiaphas, where he was beaten, spat upon, insulted, and endured a painful night in captivity.


The focus of the reflection for the fourth church is the first time Jesus was brought before Pilate, the Roman governor of the region. There Jesus was accused by the Jewish religious authorities of being a rival king to Caesar. In the fifth church, the pilgrim follows the Lord as he is taken to King Herod, who along with his guards mock him. The sixth church recalls Jesus being taken from Herod and brought before Pilate for the second time and then scourged, crowned with thorns, mocked, and condemned to death.

The last church commemorates Christ carrying the cross on his shoulders from the Praetorium, where Pilate yielded to the crowd's demand for his crucifixion, to Mount Calvary where he suffered excruciating pain, died, and was laid to rest in a nearby tomb until his resurrection from the dead on Easter Sunday.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

Please do not choose Godparents until you receive the established Church guidelines for Godparents.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

Couples seeking the Sacrament of Marriage should call the parish office at least six months before the date of marriage. A wedding date may not be secured until meeting with the parish Deacon or Priest. At that time, the couple will be secured a date and begin the process of preparation for the Sacrament of Marriage.




